"I was on the fifth train at the beginning of July in 1939. Another three got out before the war started.

"Tragically, the train with the biggest number – 251 children – was the ninth train which was at the station when the war began on the 1st of September.

"Only two children on that train survived."

After being raised by his second family in Britain, Mr Schrecker studied history at Oxford University and became Asia-Pacific director for Reader's Digest, then came to Australia and went into publishing.

He bought his three-bedroom penthouse for "about \$100,000" in 1977.
